



Comment:

In FY2016, Time/temperature risk factors, especially cold holding (item #19), continued to be the most frequent risk factor violation marked during inspections. Hot holding (item #18) increased slightly from FY2015 to FY2016, but bears watching closely to see if there are increased violations. FY2016 also saw significant increases in the occurrence of date marking and disposition (item #20) and toxic substances properly stored and used (item #25).
