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### PUBLIC SWIMMING POOL PROGRAM ANNUAL REPORT FY2016

Total number of pools licensed: 13  
Total number of pools inspected: 11  
Total number of inspections: 15  
Number of regular inspections: 11  
Number of follow-up inspections: 4  
Number of investigation inspections: 0

Eleven of thirteen public swimming pools received at least one regular inspection. Two did not receive regular inspections during the fiscal year, but they were inspected in July of 2016.

Total number of violations marked: 10


- Average number of violations per inspection: .66
- Item #1 (Certified Pool operator) and Item #26 (Record Keeping) had an occurrence frequency of 2.
- 40% of the violations marked were related to Health and safety (Certified pool operator, flowmeter, and electrical).
- 20% of the violations marked were related to water quality (chlorine, alkalinity).
- 20% of the violations marked were related to pool operations (flow rate, record keeping and dressing room).
- 20% of the violations marked were related to construction (skimming system, and drains).
- There were several violations that we don't have records showing correction. This is unacceptable and something that will be addressed with staff during a staff meeting in 2016.

No public pools were closed in FY2016 due to imminent health hazards.


Training – we continue to offer the Swimming Pool operators training to be viewed on-line from our website, and the operators can come into the offices to take the exam. In FY2016, we had 5 individuals who took the training and test.

The emphasis for FY2016 was to continue to be on water quality, and pool operations. These made up the majority (82%) of the violations in FY2015, but dropped to 40% of the violations in FY2016. In FY2017, staff will focus on health and safety and water quality. The Environmental Health staff need to put an emphasis on following-up on a timely basis to ensure that violations marked are followed up on a timely basis to ensure compliance. This did not happen well in FY2016 and will be addressed with staff.
